

Zaccheus Sunday

There is a story about a fitness center that was offering \$1,000 to anyone who could show that they were stronger than the owner of the place. Here's how it worked. The owner would squeeze a lemon until all the juice ran into a glass, and then hand the lemon to the challenger. Anyone who could squeeze out just one more drop of juice would win the money. Many people tried over time - other weightlifters, construction workers, even professional wrestlers, - but no one could do it. One day, a short, skinny guy came in and signed up for the contest. After the laughter died down, the owner grabbed a lemon and squeezed away. Then he handed the shriveled remains of the fruit to the little man. The crowd's laughter turned to silence as the unassuming challenger clenched his fist around the lemon and six drops fell into the glass. As the crowd cheered, the manager paid the winning prize and asked

the short guy what he did for a living. "Are you a lumberjack, a weightlifter, or what?" The man replied, "I work for the IRS."

Each year as we approach Great Lent, we listen to the Gospel selection about Zaccheus, the tax collector in the time of Jesus. Tax collectors then were as unpopular as they are today, and Zaccheus was no exception. In those times, tax collectors were not really government employees, but rather sub-contractors who earned their living off revenue they collected. In essence, they were extortionists. Zaccheus was chief among them. In addition to being disliked because of his profession, Zaccheus was a short man, which invited more criticism.

Zaccheus heard that Jesus was coming to town and, like everyone else, he wanted to see what Jesus was all about. However, with so many people lining the streets and given Zaccheus' short stature, he couldn't get a good view. What was the poor little guy to do? He climbed up a sycamore tree and crawled way out onto a tree limb to get a good view.

From this vantage point, not only did Zaccheus get a good view of Jesus, but Jesus also got a good view of Zaccheus - both physically and spiritually!! Why did Zaccheus really want to see Jesus? Was it out of mere curiosity, or was there emptiness in his life that he wanted to fill? He had his money; he had his career, but he had very little else. Apart from Roman officials and the tax collectors who worked for him, Zaccheus had few friends. Most theologians believe that Jesus saw the void that existed within Zaccheus and this is why He told him to come down from the tree and invited Himself to dine at Zaccheus' house. Through this gesture, Jesus shined His heavenly light on Zaccheus 'heart, transforming Zaccheus' worldly priorities to spiritual priorities. Through his extortionist activities, Zaccheus had become quite wealthy, but his wealth could not buy him happiness. After he experienced this enlightenment, Zaccheus was a changed man, no longer concerned with money, turning instead to correcting his past wrongs.

In our hectic world, we often focus on achievement of material rewards, just like the old Zaccheus. We think we can find our fulfillment in these things. But like the old Zaccheus, we discover that no matter how we try, we will always find an emptiness still waiting to be filled. Sometimes, it takes going out on a limb to find that spiritual fulfillment that we lack.

A few Sundays ago, we heard the story of the rich young man. Both Zaccheus and the rich young man had positions of authority. Both Zaccheus and the rich young

man had their money and material possessions. The difference was the young man could not part with his wealth when asked to; but Zaccheus decided to give away half of his wealth without even being asked to do so. He chose to do so out of gratitude and repentance. As the rich young man walked away from our Lord, Jesus made the comment about a camel trying to get through the eye of a needle and how difficult it is for a rich person to get into the Kingdom of God. The story of Zaccheus, however, ends with Jesus saying, "Today, salvation has come to this house".

Jesus can do the same for us today. It does not have to be as difficult as a camel going through the eye of a needle. The story of Zaccheus shows us that. All we have to do is accept His message in faith and repent. Maybe, we may have to make an effort in faith, by going out on a limb to get a better view, but if we do, Jesus will take care of the rest.
